On November 2, a group of Cramahe Hort and OHA District 4 members and the OHA executive board gathered at the Town Hall garden in Castleton to honour John Sellers with the planting of a serviceberry tree and a beautiful plaque created by Hoselton Studios. John is a past Director of District 4 and Past President of the Ontario Horticultural Association, and has been a member of Cramahe Hort since 1998.





Winter decorations for your planters, urns and baskets don't have to be costly. You may have some material on your own property. Maybe you can get more from a friend, or possibly from some wild areas when you drive around the countryside. All dried plant material can be left completely natural as it has its own intrinsic beauty. Add a colourful bow and you are done! When the season is over, put away the bow for next year and return the plants to the earth. No waste!

Usually I leave things natural but this year I decided to go with traditional red, green and white. I used some cedar branches as a kind of 'skirt', or first layer, around the rim of the pot. Then I used some tall white pine branches in the centre and some medium lengths around and in between. Next I used red-twig dogwood and sumac berry clusters for their red colour. I had cut a few branches of crab apple so put them in too. Next I went for branches of the beautiful green kerria. I grow this shrub specifically for its extraordinary green colour in the winter. If you grow snowberry you can use it too- for its big white berries – although after they've been frozen they turn brown and don't look as attractive.

From my field, I cut a few stalks of milkweed pods and pulled out the rest of the seeds. I let them go to their destiny on the wind. After the pods dried indoors for a couple of days, I spray-painted them my chosen colours and put them in the display. I also cut some stems of goldenrod with galls, dried them and painted them too. I noticed the stems and seed heads from goatsbeard and snakeroot were interesting so cut them and added them, too. I left them natural. As a finishing touch I added some red butterflies I had found at a craft store.



Really, the sky is the limit! Use whatever looks interesting to you – Christmas ornaments, pine cones, candy canes or branches from curly willow. Most years this has to be done before the soil freezes in your pots, but as this is an exceptionally mild year, I think there is still time. Have fun!

I want to pass on only one story today that arose from our meeting in November, because it's an important one, and by the time of our Annual General Meeting and delicious Pot Luck Dinner, it hadn't become completely finalized.

It is that our (returning – thank you, Sharron!) President, will no longer be the Coordinator for the Garden Shed Market Place at Apple Blossom Tyme Festival, as of now. Which means that Cramahe Horticultural Society no longer has any stake in the ABTF, since Sharron was IT!

Some background: yes, the Garden Shed Market Place was a large money earner for Cramahe Hort for years, and we were happy to have Sharron do all the work while we got the money. And even though more Cramahe Hort members got involved in some of the grunt work last year, it really was all Sharron. After taking over the Market project from the ABTF (because they didn't want to deal with it and weren't doing it particularly well), Sharron steadily built it up over several years and gained many new vendors, turning it into an event that they loved attending.

Recently, the ABTF Committee indicated that they wanted to take back control of the Garden Shed Market. So, after many years of hard work, Sharron felt it was time to simply step away altogether. The Cramahe Hort Executive Board unanimously supported that decision. Consequently, Sharron tendered her letter of resignation at the last ABTF Committee meeting, effective immediately.

This will take a big load off Sharron's very crowded Presidential Desk, where she continues to sit for a third term, to help the Hort Society stay afloat; so in a way it's a good thing to make that job less onerous.

It is important to note that the name "Garden Shed Market Place" is the market as run by Cramahe Hort, and as such, that name will not be used in future years by ABTF. We will continue with our Plant Sale, and indeed that becomes more important, revenue-wise; but we will be just another vendor, like anyone else.

But onward we go, and now we need to make the Plant Sale bigger and better, and come up with some new fundraising ideas as well. So let's all keep that in mind as gardening plans float through our winter daydreams.
