# ~~Entice your Houseplants to make it through Winter

No matter what, Winter is different for houseplants. Humidity in your home is lower (~20 percent), sunshine is extremely limited. Not surprising that they complain by dropping leaves and flowers and....just look unhappy.

### Here are some tips:

- Water only when your plants need it, even stop watering altogether.
  - Tropicals: when leaves begin to droop or drop, soil very dry to the touch
  - Too much water shows is indicated by yellowing leaves.
  - Misting plants for humidity is an excellent way to add moisture without overwatering.
  - create a more humid climate by putting a dish filled with stones and water
  - Cactus, Snake Plant, African Violet: when your finger shoved deep into the soil is not cool.
  - Do not let plants stand in water
  - Do not fertilize
  - Dust with a damp cloth
- Avoid Cold Air Exposure
  - place plants in an area where the temperature is warm and constant
  - avoid draughts from outside air
- Light, as in sunlight, is at a premium at this time of year and so it is natural that your plants will not be at their very best.
  - group all you plants together to give them the best environmental care
  - sun loving plants like hibiscus or bougainvillea will lose their leaves
  - you can add supplemental light by using grow lights, being careful to follow instructions on how close to place them to your plants.

### Bugs Ugh!

- Our homes are dryer now encouraging the aphids, mealy bugs and red spider mites.
- Use a rubbing alcohol soaked cloth to wipe away mealy bugs, spray away aphids and spider mites with tepid water every day.

# ~~How to Germinate Perennials during the Winter Months

### **Components:**

- 1. Clear plastic container with clear plastic lid (shoe-box size). Available at the Dollar Store. Punch numerous holes in the bottom and in the lid of the container.
- 2. Perennial seeds of your choice.
- 3. Potting Soil.

### Method:

- 1. Fill the plastic container to 1/2 full with potting soil.
- 2. Dampen the soil thoroughly but do not soak.
- 3. Sprinkle your perennial seeds onto the soil.
- 4. Cover the seeds with potting soil as per the seed package instructions.
- 5. Cover with the lid.
- 6. Place in a sunny (south exposure is best) location outside in the snow.
- Let nature run it's course until the end of May. Moisture will freeze and melt through the container and the sun will bring the sprouts to life.
- 8. Transplant when the weather is warm and sunny

# ~~Warm up winter with soup lovers herb gardens

If you're a soup lover, you're an herb lover. Here are some of the best herbs to grow for your home made soups.

For hearty soups choose Bay Leaf, Rosemary & Oregano.
These herbs grow well together in a south-facing window and let dry out before watering.

For creamy soups choose Parsley & Lemon Balm.

These herbs like full sun and should be kept moist but well-drained. The flavour of lemon balm is perfect for lightening up creamy soups, use parsley to garnish.

### For Vegetable soups choose Basil

Plant densely, place in a south-facing window and let the soil dry out before watering. Basil is excellent in minestrones and other vegetable soups.

# Do you like winter Countertop Herb Gardens?

Here's a fun and easy way to create an herb garden using old tin cans and wine corks.

### What you need:

- cleaned out tin cans spray paint
- Wooden skewers wine corks

### To Do:

apply two coats of spray paint to the outside of each can, let dry.

- wrap a length of raffia around each can several times, then tie into a bow.
- fill cans with soil and plant herbs or pop in a store-bought herb pot
- write the herb names on the corks, push skewers into the corks and add skewers to the soil.
